
Thank you so much for supporting parent's meetings - they were very well attended.

### **Science Day**



On 17<sup>th</sup> March we celebrated 'science day'. This year the theme was 'growth'. Throughout the day children explored and looked at all different themes in relation to growth. There was a range of activities - planting seeds or bulbs either in the allotment or in pots to grow in classrooms, a spring walk to see what was growing whilst others looked at how they grow from a baby to an adult.



Older pupils had the opportunity to carry out an experiment on how to grow crystals whilst the younger pupils were able to engage with a 'make your own garden' using different pieces to build up flowers from the ground upwards. Pupils also were able to make seed bombs and potato grass heads. There were virtual PE demonstrations to join in, concentrating on how animals grow and change in their movements from babies to adults.

It was a very eventful day with all the children having lots of fun!

#### Gym

During February half term new gym equipment was installed at St George's into the old common room. The room has been partitioned so there is a dedicated gym space for the equipment.

The School Council helped to choose the new equipment which has been funded by Living Sport.

The equipment includes a rowing machine, a treadmill and an adapted bike which will be accessible for wheelchairs.

Staff are currently being inducted on the equipment after which, students will have their induction. This means that we will be able to timetable sessions for students. The intention is to open this more widely to our school community.

It is undoubtedly a position of real responsibility, but it is also tremendously rewarding to feel that you are playing a part in improving the life chances of young people at Heltwate - what a privilege!

### <u>Attendance</u>

Class Dojo messages are being sent this week to parent / carers whose children have less than 90% attendance. As of 29<sup>th</sup> March, 90% attendance means your child has missed 12 days of school, and 80% is 24 missed school days which is almost 5 weeks. Missed days really have an impact on your child's learning and socialising skills.

The whole school attendance percentage for the school year up to 29<sup>th</sup> March is 89.9%. This is an expected dip from previous years due to the increase in COVID absences. Our attendance is significantly higher than the national average for special schools. During the week beginning 14<sup>th</sup> March, our attendance was 89.9% and the national average was 82.9%

To report a school absence please either send a class dojo message or telephone the school office on 01733 262878 by 9.15 a.m.

If you feel there are issues other than illness that are affecting your child's attendance please do contact school. We want to work with you and your child to ensure that your child is able to attend and help in any way which we can.

### Leave of Absence

Heltwate School will only authorise Leave of Absence under exceptional circumstances. The Governors of Heltwate School consider that 'exceptional' circumstances do not occur regularly by definition and are one off occasions. **HOLIDAYS WILL NOT BE AUTHORISED.** 

Requests for exceptional leave of absence should be made at least 4 school weeks in advance and will be considered on an individual basis by the Headteacher as delegated by the Governing Body, (or in their absence by a Deputy Headteacher). Forms are available to download from the school website:

Please can we remind those who bring and collect their child into school that <u>the school site cannot be</u> accessed between 8.40 a.m. – 9.00 a.m. and 2.30 p.m. - 3.15 p.m. by parent / carer vehicles. If you do come onto site during these times you will be asked to move your vehicle.

# School Transport

All transport is managed by Peterborough City Council. If you need to speak to the transport team about your child's transport please ring 01733 317455 or the switchboard on 01733 747474 and ask for passenger transport. Please DO NOT contact the school office.

# School Dinners

Dinners are £2.70 a day for Years 3-6 and £2.90 a day for Year 7 upwards. Pupils in Reception, Year 1 and 2 do not need to pay.

Families who receive certain benefits may be eligible for free school meals. Your child is eligible if you're in receipt of one of the following benefits:

- Universal Credit with an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400.
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for the four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
