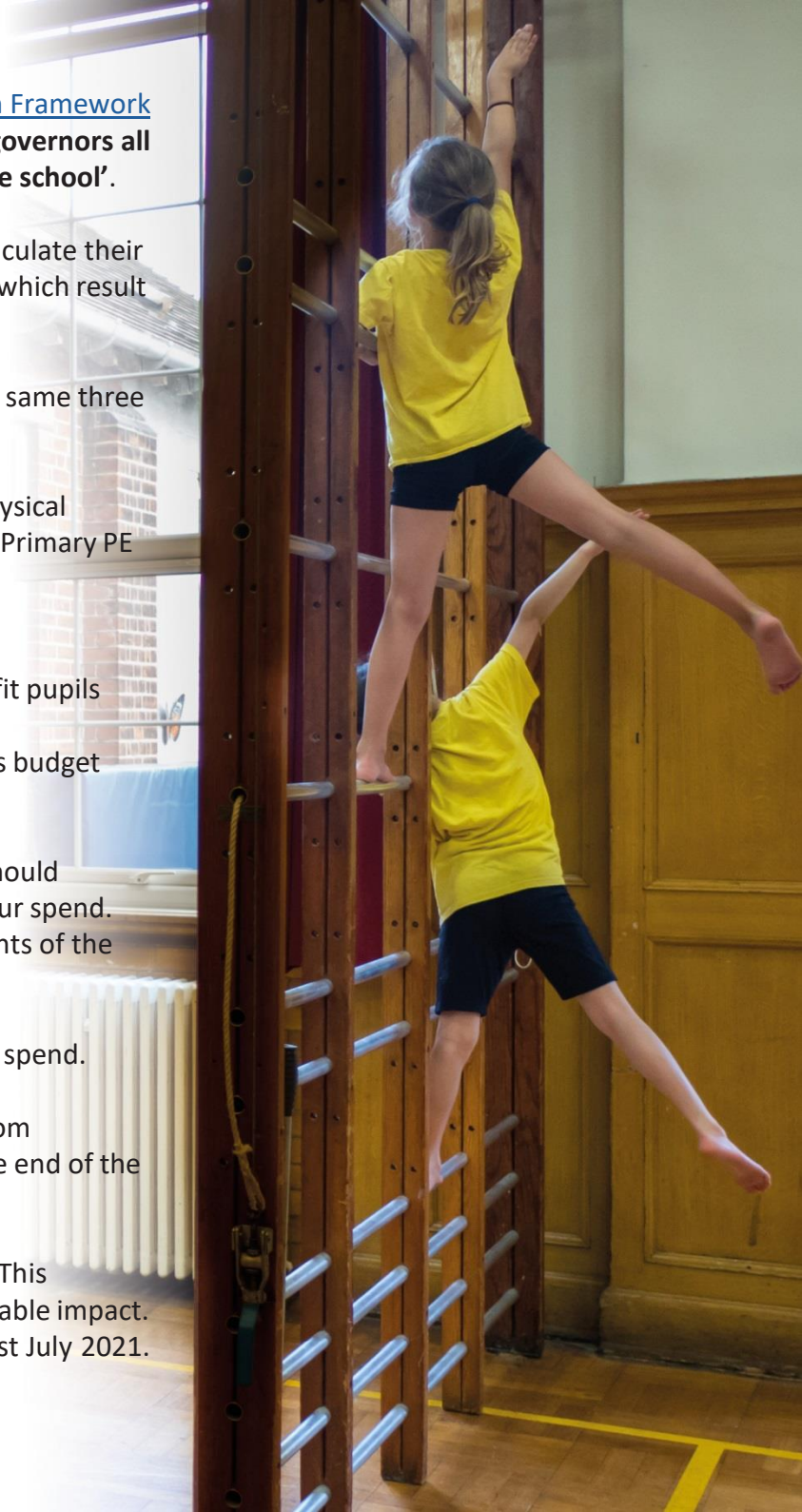

<p>All classrooms have access to trampettes, exercise balls or some form of physical activity equipment. They can therefore now participate in physical activity throughout the day in the class room and outside provisions, with PE and playtimes additional to this. All children have the opportunity to do their recommended 30 minutes a day physical activity with this equipment to aid them.</p> <p>Improved teacher confidence to deliver their own PE lessons. Teachers now leading their own PE have access to an easy to follow scheme of work / activity cards as well as a new sensory physical activity scheme that uses technology to enhance learner experiences, training will be provided imminently to teaching staff to enhance delivery and provision.</p> <p>Equipment has been maintained and inspected; it has ensured that equipment is appropriate for all of our learners needs. The school is growing with an ever-increasing number of pupils. Additional adapted or more sensory provision / equipment has been provided to ensure inclusive physical activity and PE.</p> <p>Heltwate attended the Regional Table Cricket competition in Newmarket and came 4th.
