As Covid cases decrease, we are all pleased that the lockdown continues to ease as part of the Government Roadmap and more restrictions are being lifted. conversations about farming and wheat and what products come from crops like these.

Heltwate St George's Outdoor Garden Area

Students across St. George's have been working with **Fenton's Herbology** in order to transform our outdoor space into a beautiful garden and allotment area. On Tuesdays, Scarlet Class work with Nicola from Fenton's Herbology in the afternoons. Students have been very busy learning about the proper way to grow seeds, how to create wildflower areas, and learning a number of other new skills.

Fenton's Herbology offers a unique learning experience where practical learning is combined with opportunities to experience plants using our intuition and all of our senses. This includes observing the plants that we grow from seed, smelling the plants as we work amongst them, tasting herbs through hot and cold infusions in our tea breaks and observing how we feel in our bodies and enjoying the vegetables that we grow to cook.



Scarlet student Shelby has written about her favourite parts:

'First, we learnt how plants grow. We learnt all about vegetables that we could grow. We had lots of fun marking out the shapes on the ground for our wildflowers to grow in. It was really hard work digging the area before we scattered our seeds. We planted sunflower seeds in pots and tyres, and we spray painted the tyres'.





The idea over time, is to develop the outdoor space @St George's into a vibrant, community outdoor environment. At Heltwate the intention is to teach students horticultural skills and herbal knowledge in a safe and secure environment to develop each individual's ability to mix socially, grow in confidence and learn and develop practical skills that will enable them to become more independent and employable.

D of E Practise walks

On the 13th and 20th May 2021 two groups took part in their practise walks as part of their Expedition Section for their D of E Bronze Award. All students carried a rucksack containing essentials needed for their walk. They worked as a team and supported each other walking from Bretton through Marholm and back again. All students stopped for lunch at Marholm and used a trangia camping stove to cook food that they will be eating on their Qualifying Expedition in June. We are so proud of both groups as it did rain but all students carried on, recognising a selection of leaves throughout the walk. Well done everyone!

Heltwate School will authorise Leave of Absence only under exceptional circumstances. The Governors of Heltwate School consider that 'exceptional' circumstances do not occur regularly by definition and are one off occasions. **HOLIDAYS WILL NOT BE AUTHORISED.**

Requests for exceptional leave of absence should be made at least 4 school weeks in advance and will be considered on an individual basis by the Headteacher as delegated by the Governing Body, (or in their absence by a Deputy Headteacher). Forms are available to download from the school website.

School Dinners

Pupils are continuing to eat their lunches in their class due to COVID restrictions. This is proving to be a much more relaxed environment for pupils. The school dinners are individually portioned so please make sure you have ordered your child's lunch if you know your child will be late into school.

We would like to encourage as many of you as possible to consider the school dinner option for your child. Research carried out by the Children's Food Trust shows that children who eat a nutritionally balanced meal at lunch time were more alert and over three times more likely to be 'on-task' working with a teacher after lunch time, than those who didn't. In addition, research carried out by Oxford and Essex universities showed children eating healthier lunches do far better in tests and absences through sickness dropped by around 14%

So check out the menu on the website and we do encourage you to let your child try school dinners.

School dinners are priced at:

Junior dinners (Reception to Yr 2 – no charge) (Yrs 3-6) are £2.70 a day, £13.50 a week Senior dinners (Yrs 7-14) are £2.90 a day, £14.50 a week.

If you pay for your child's dinners please use our online payment system - ParentPay. If you have not yet registered, please contact the school office for information.

REGULAR PAYMENTS HAVE TO BE MADE – YOU WILL BE ASKED TO SEND YOUR CHILD WITH A PACKED LUNCH IF YOU DO NOT

ALL children in Reception, Year 1 or Year 2 are eligible to receive a free school dinner as part the Governments school dinner initiative. We would encourage you to let your child take this opportunity.
