It's been a funny old year: are we in school? are we out? Children have made great progress and learned to cope with so many changes. It has been a fantastic achievement.

Children have worked extremely hard this year and deserve to feel proud of their efforts. We wish all our leavers every success for the future and hope that they feel prepared for the challenges to come. I would like to thank our staff who have worked hard to make Heltwate the exciting, stimulating place it is. It is interesting that we are having discussions in school about how much 'lag' or 'catch-up' is needed, our children have suffered; it isn't always easy to see. The smiling faces of children coming into school and in classes does not display the level of loss we perhaps could have expected. School is a happy and purposeful place. Some of the restrictions that have been placed on the school have been beneficial, smaller groups, less social mixing, less unsupervised time, more consistent staffing etc. Pupils seem just happy to be in school.

The new curriculum pathways have been a great success. From September 2021 the whole school will be formally recording personal development milestones. I am very excited by the data the new tracker is producing. Patterns show many of our children show little or no academic progress over the first term, for those children who have started the Engage curriculum that is now not the case. This really is a big step forward.

I am sure I will be writing to parents again over the summer to explain arrangements for September in light of government announcements about Covid restrictions. Whilst I am pleased that many restrictions (like bubble groups) will be lifted soon, there will be some routines and rules that we will be following as a school to be on the safe side. It is very hard planning ahead when we don't know how Covid will be affecting our community in September. All parents and carers have been so supportive since the first lockdown and I know I can count on this support and understanding to continue as we end this term and think ahead to the next

We recognise that the disruption to education due to COVID this year has been a significant challenge and has put families under pressure. We really appreciate your support following the guidance and ensuring that your child had COVID tests if required and for keeping school informed.

We are hopeful that from September the disruption will be not as significant.

Our school target is 94% attendance and we can report that whole school attendance for this school year is 93.6%. 64% of pupils have attendance over 94%. COVID related absences do not count in the attendance figures.

# Healthy School Curriculum Day

A go-kart competition was held. Pupils raced around the playground on a track. Prizes were given to the fastest and to those who showed good sportsmanship and effort.


Throughout the day pupils took part in exercise challenges, laughing yoga and meditation sessions. There was positive feedback from all classes and the day was such a success.
